President's Column

Dear Colleagues –

I am writing as the first President of the newly rejoined Eastern Section of SEPM (ES-SEPM). At the last business meeting of the NE and SE SEPM sections, held at the 2004 NE-SE GSA meeting in Tysons Corner, Virginia, it was decided to merge the two sections into the ES-SEPM. Both the NE and SE sections have recently suffered periods of inactivity so we are joining forces in an attempt to invigorate and resume the Section's activity.

My name is Bosiljka Glumac. I am an Associate Professor of Geology at Smith College in Northampton, Massachusetts. I came to the United States in 1991 from Croatia to study at the University of Tennessee. I hold an undergraduate degree in geology from the University of Zagreb, Croatia and a Ph.D. from UT Knoxville. My dissertation research focused on Upper Cambrian carbonates from the southern Appalachians. Among several other new directions my research has subsequently expanded to Cambrian strata throughout the US Appalachians. Thus, in the way that I work on correlating strata from the southeastern to the northeastern US, as the Section's President I will work to connect geoscientists throughout this region.

I would also like to thank my colleague Al Curran from Smith College (acurran@email.smith.edu) for his many years of service as he continues as the Section's Secretary/Treasurer. We are currently looking for a Vice President and the Councilors for both the NE and SE GSA meetings. Please let me know if you are interested or if you know someone who might be in helping the Section with this. Thanks in advance!

The ES-SEPM will hold its annual business meeting alternating between the NE and SE GSA annual meetings. Our next gathering will be at the NE GSA meeting in Saratoga Springs, New York in March of 2005. The National SEPM President Elect, William A. Morgan, a principal stratigrapher for ConocoPhillips in Houston, will attend our business meeting and give the keynote address. The ES-SEPM will be co-sponsoring symposia, theme sessions and field trips at the 2005 NE GSA meeting and at the SE GSA meeting in Biloxi, Mississippi in March 2005. This Fall the ES-SEPM will also be co-sponsoring trips at the annual field conferences of the New York State Geological Association (NYSGA) and the New England Intercollegiate Geological Conference (NEIGC). Secretary/Treasurer's Report

\$\$\$: The finances of the newly rejoined ES-SEPM are in great shape! Following the joint NE-SE Sections SEPM business meeting held during the NE-SE GSA meeting in Tysons Corner in March at which the decision to merge the two sections was made, I received a check for close to \$1,000. from Jack Hall, the retiring treasurer of the SE Section. ES-SEPM presently has a balance of \$6,325.02 in an interest-paying checking account. Recent expenses have been minimal. We paid for modest expenses associated with the business meeting in Tysons Corner, we have mailing expenses for this newsletter, and we are going to contribute \$250. in support of the upcoming NEIGC field trips co-sponsored by ES-SEPM (see announcements to follow).

There is a free lunch!!!! (at least for now.....): Given the low level of activity of the NE Section of SEPM over the past couple of years, I have not sent out any new requests for dues payments. As announced above by President Bosiljka Glumac, there will be no new dues requested for this academic year (2004-05). All questions relating to dues (resumed dues billing and dues amounts) will be an important agenda item for the ES-SEPM business meeting to be held in Saratoga Springs in March 2005, in conjunction with the NE GSA meeting.
